

# 4. Ruary Laidlaw 80<sup>th</sup> Birthday Celebration

Lochiel Club and friends gathered on March 23 to celebrate the 80th birthday of life member Ruary Laidlaw.

Ruary is a longtime stalwart of the club, he was the teacher from 1992 until 2016 and is still involved with teaching and actively participates in all Club activities. He was made a life member in 2011.

It is a mark of the esteem in which Ruary is held that around 50 dancers and former dancers came from the wider WaiBop region to help him celebrate. We began with a potluck luncheon followed by an afternoon of dance.

Club teacher Helen Smythe compiled a dance programme from a list of favourite dances selected by Ruary and included five dances devised by him, including Dianne Murdoch's Promenade & Christine Miller's Reel, both ladies being in attendance.

Ruary has produced two teaching guides for Scottish Country Dancing and published several books of Scottish Country Dances. Many of the dances are named for local personalities or places of particular importance to Ruary. However, until now, no

#### Ruary's Rant

(32 bar jig for 3 couples in a 4 couple set)

- 1-8 1st couple dance symmetric reels of 3 on the side with 2nd and 3rd couples. 1st couple dance in and down to begin, all couples touch hands as they meet in the reels
- 9-16 1st couple lead down the middle for 3, lead up for 3, cross over and cast to 2nd place. (2nd couple move up on bars 15-16)
- 17-24 1st couple dance diagonal rights and lefts, 1L giving right hand to 3L, and 1M giving right hand to 2M to begin
- 25-28 3,1 & 2 L face up, 3,1 & 2M face down and chase halfway around the set
- 29-32 2s, 1s & 3s turn partner once round with the right hand

Repeat from 2nd place.

On the 3rd , 5th & 7th time through, 4th couple commence the reel by dancing up from 4th place as the 1st couple step out and down to 4th place.

#### 5. Teachers' Workshop 2024



Ruary in full flight!

I was approached late last year with a request, asking if we could invite club dancers who might be thinking about teaching SC dancing, and giving them an opportunity to be exposed to fundamental aspects of teaching. It was suggested that these aspiring teachers need not have the desire to take on the whole Teacher Training and working towards being certificated, but who would just like to teach maybe now and then or even full-time at some later date.

Initially, I looked on the RSCDS website to see what if anything was on offer along these lines. There was quite a bit of "stuff" but most of it was geared towards candidates for teacher training towards certification.

I then had some communication with Esther Mackay (Waitemata Club) as she ran a Teachers' Workshop for our Region many years ago. She gave me a couple of pointers:

- Those who might be interested have to do some sort of preparation before they get up and teach and it falls to the Club teacher to sort that out.
- I would probably run a half hour session at the workshop and call it a discussion which would include all the teachers – the certificated teachers may have been in the same position at some time and able to give their advice.
- I would certainly put it back on all teachers taking clubs and hopefully there will be a few ideas they could use. A list of all the ideas can be recorded. Another of Esther's suggestions was to maybe "employ" Ruth Budden to run a half hour session for us in her capacity as NZ Branch tutor for Teacher Training. I had thought along similar lines and looking at what Esther had come up with, thought maybe Ruth could run the discussion to begin with and then do a bit of practical work using some of the points that came out of the discussion perhaps.

I approached Ruth, who is a very busy lady, and she was okay to do this but not on the date we had pencilled in for our workshop. Ruth gave us the alternative date of Saturday, May 4 and in consultation with Jeanette Lauder (Region President) and Robyn Howes who had made the initial request, we booked Ruth in.

Once Ruth had confirmed, I sent a flyer out to club teachers requesting that they encourage would-be and all-comers to attend this workshop. There may be dancers in our clubs who would love to attend but who might be put off by the fact that certificated teachers will make up the bulk of attendees. As we all know there are many fantastic teachers in our Region who are not qualified with a certificate but who have talent and are doing superb jobs in keeping SC dancing alive and well through their own passion for SC dancing and wanting to share this passion.

Please teachers, stress the fact that your occasional "wannabes" are the exact people we are aiming this workshop at, and that attendance would not necessarily mean that they wish to embark on a journey to become a certificated teacher of SC dancing.

Some of our Region teachers attended the Teachers' Workshop in Wellington over Easter and I'm sure they will come back all enthused and willing to share any "know-how" that came out of that.

Part 2 of the workshop will be an opportunity for all to dance some of the dances included in the new RSCDS Book 53 publication.

RAGLAN, the dancing programme runs from Saturday morning to Sunday evening, allowing Friday evening and Monday to travel.

It's exciting to see old friends and for newer dancers to make dancing friends.

There are 3 classes on Saturday morning, a high energy class and ball walk through on Saturday afternoon. A ball on Saturday night, combined class Sunday afternoon and Ceilidh on Sunday evening.

Registrations – 50 would be the ideal number but we're not there yet. Please make the effort to enrol, come and have fun. Full School registration fee is \$130.

Accommodation in Raglan includes a motor camp with cabins tourist flats and motels, a centrally located backpackers and other options.

Our region has a tradition of hosting a dancing school every winter over the long weekend. Formerly Queen's Birthday and now King's birthday weekend. We are a region where dancers on the region committee support dancers via the clubs as much as possible.

The clubs are the engine houses for Scottish country dancing. Clubs take a turn at hosting the dancing school, traditionally alternating between Waikato and bay of Plenty, each year.

More recently we've had a couple of years with no club volunteering and in 2022 a loose committee was formed and hosted a school at Whakatane, and this year Wayne McConnel has again invited a few people to help him organise a weekend school. He has chosen halls with care, taken advice and chosen good dance teachers, had a hand in the ball programme, organised musicians for two of the three Saturday classes, and Bourach Mor, our local band, are working hard to give a great sound for Saturday and Sunday evening events.

It's going to be a cracker weekend, cold weather so dress warmly and have fun.

#### 7. Technology Matters

First, a reminder to any RSCDS members who have recently changed their email address, particularly if you have discontinued your 'xtra' address rather than pay the annual charge of \$71 which will be introduced in May.

The administrative structure of the RSCDS means that your details are recorded separately at each level of the organisation (HQ, Branch, Region), each of which needs to be informed about any changes. I recommend that you send updates via the 'Member Update' form on the NZ Branch website at ~ <u>https://dancescottish.org.nz/member-update</u> ~ This will ensure that the information is passed to both the Region and NZ Branch (which also manages the HQ records).

You may be aware that I have handed over responsibility for the NZ Branch website to Fiona McCutcheon as the new IT Co-ordinator. Previously, having received an update to the Region website (e.g. events or directory), I would also apply the update to the Branch website. Of course, this no longer happens so be sure to keep the Branch informed, ideally using the appropriate form on the Branch website.

Finally, it was 10 years ago that I took on the task of setting up our Region website and email facilities and have continued to keep these up to date. I am now looking for a volunteer to take over this task, partly to ensure that the understanding of the system is not confined to a single individual. The processes are well-documented and the hand-over can be carried out in stages if necessary. #### 8. Virtual Teachers' Conference

I recently "took part" (well I was a video watcher) in the Virtual Teachers' Conference run by the RSCDS (Royal Scottish Country Dance Society for those of you who may be new to Scottish Country dancing) from February 26 until March 1. This was a week of learning made possible by the "wonderful contributions of Teachers' Associations from around the globe."

Topics covered over the 5 days were:

Which Music, When - Coordinated by the RSCDS Music Director, Luke Brady

Devising a Dance - Coordinated by the Australian Teachers' Alliance (ATA)

Getting Young Adults Dancing – Coordinated by the Teachers' Association Canada (TAC)

Writing and Teaching a Display – RSCDS Education and Training Coordinator

Start Dancing – Getting School Children Dancing – Teachers' Association Scotland (TAS)

Which Music, When and Devising a Dance. We have covered both of these topics fairly extensively through the Teachers' Workshops which I have coordinated and led during my tenure as Education and Training Coordinator for our Region.

Writing and Teaching a Display Hmmm! I thought I would leave that one to the likes of Katharine Hoskyn (Auckland Region). Choreography plays a big part in this, and Katharine is very skilful in that department!

Getting School Children Dancing. This would be relatively easy if like in Scotland, Country Dancing was in our curriculum, but not so easy introducing this in NZ schools. Many of us have tried, few have succeeded!

Getting Young Adults Dancing. This is the one that I had trouble getting my head around, with gender neutral calling. Young people are reimagining gender roles, and don't necessarily adhere to traditional ones. I get that! They learn to dance from either side of the set and can dance with anyone. I have no difficulty with that, after all, women danced from either side long before I came on the scene. And I can even understand gender neutral terminology in suggesting that one could say "Dance to your right" rather than "woman up" and "man down." But when it comes to "landmark" calling e.g. "musician's side", or "wall clock side", or "larks" and "robins" in the mix, I'm sorry! What!!

In the video the "lark" on the "wall clock side" (presumably a teacher – sorry, not allowed to state his whoops, the gender) said, "We find there are many clever ways to refer to corners, positions, directions, and to be creative with these things instead of using strictly gendered terms. The advantage of this is that it removes a layer of abstraction." I just wish he, whoops, the "lark" had elaborated because I was left "reeling!"

Okay, further down the track – What happens when these young folk join a group of "oldies" who have never danced with gender neutral terminology? And what happens with our instruction books? Do they all get recalled to be rewritten using "larks" and robins"? What happens if my class relates to "rats" and "rabbits" or "cars" and "trucks" and not "larks" and "robins"?

I understand that for some this is, or could be a genuine concern, and yes, I have been a bit flippant over what that genuine concern for some might be. But, please don't judge me just because I'm going to stick with what I know. I have a few very dear friends who are LGBTQIA or belong to a Rainbow Community but this old dog is too long in the tooth to learn new tricks! If it means that College kids won't come to an event with gendered calling then I'm really going to have to put myself out to pasture!
