Everyone had brought a plate for the Pot-Luck afternoon tea. It is amazing how good these are.



11. Index to Formations and Movements

Recently I was looking for a straightforward dance with mirror reels of three on your own side, so I turned to the 'Index to Formations and Movements' on the RSCDS website. This impressive development of the original index was launched by HQ last year but, if you missed the announcement, you may be unaware of this valuable resource.

Essentially, it comprises a PDF which lists all formations (with every possible variation) a list of its formations and, if this was not enough, links to the entries for the dance on the SCD Dance Database and SCD Dictionary. As you would expect, only the dances published by the RSCDS are listed.

It is only available after logging on to the RSCDS website at which point you can navigate to it via: /Learn/ Resources for Dancers/ Index to Formations and Movements/

12. Luckenbooth Brooch

We recently danced The Luckenbooth Brooch (book 53) so new to us all where the devisor J B Dickson manages to introduce extra twists and turns.

This was of interest, so when researching, I learned the Brooch - (note pronunciation!) dates back to the 15th Century where at the top of Edinburgh's Royal Mile gold and silversmiths by day created their jewellery in small booths which they locked up at night.

Of especial note were their small silver brooches; one heart, or two intertwined, surmounted by a crown, perhaps that of Mary Queen of Scots. Some, as reflected in our dance, were extremely complex in design.

The Luckenbooth meaning is that of love, loyalty and protection and was commonly given as a gift from a mother to her daughter. Also, a symbol of love and devotion which often was given to his betrothed at their wedding, then traditionally, in some areas, pinned to their first baby's shawl to ward off evil spirits while ensuring a free flow of milk for them. This is going back 600 yrs ago when many babies didn't survive.

Out of interest I asked if any of the (lady) dancers possessed one, several raised their hands, with one brooch passed on by her mother - which could put it back nearly 100 yrs!

It would be of great interest if readers could share the story of their own Luckenbooth brooch or a story of their walk along the Royal Mile. Did you spot the Heart of Midlothian in the cobblestones if you've walked the Royal Mile?

13. Obituary ~ Pam Godfrey

Pam Godfrey, a past tutor at Hamilton Scottish, passed away on Saturday, September 28, 2024.

Pam was a dancer from an early age dancing Ballet and Tap as a child and still taking part in Scottish Country Dancing and Tap well into her 80's.

She became involved in Scottish Country Dancing when her young daughter started with Hamilton Scottish in the 1970's. She studied for her Teacher's Certificate, attending several Summer Schools, and gaining her certificate in 1982.

She helped Club tutor Lorna Whitford with class tuition and in 1997 she became the club tutor. Pam was Club Tutor for 20 years and in the years before Covid helped present tutor Wayne McConnel with Wednesday night's tuition. Pam was also club secretary from 1979 to 1982, and in 2006 became a Life Member of the club.

Pam loved teaching both adults and children. Her specialty was Theme evenings when club dancers dressed up and Pam created new titles for known dances. One of the best ones was a pyjama party and an annual one was dress-up as a dance title.

She gave encouragement and support to young dancers going for their medal tests. This was also good for the adults in improving their dancing steps and formations.

Her dedication to teaching was exemplified when she broke her leg delivering meals on wheels. She arrived at the next club night in a wheelchair and her leg in plaster, a programme mapped out and able dancers ready to demonstrate.

Scottish will hold an event to honour the life of a wonderful lady who loved dancing and teaching. (See article 9 for further details)
